# TRIP REPORTS: and other lies and stories



#### Little Crystal Cave Trip January 1, 1997

Cave: Little Crystal Cave, Hardeman County, Texas.

Cavers: Meliene Davis, Gary Maham, Tom Kaler, and Rebecca Lee.

Tom and I went to a New Year's eve party at Meliene's house December 31 and were met with a great surprise. We were asked if we wanted to go caving. Being the cavers that we are, of course we want to go caving on the first day of the year.

There are a couple of caves the North Texas Speleological Society has access to and this was our opportunity. We jumped even though we did not have our gear with us. The only gear we had that New Year's Eve night was chips, champagne, and beer. Melynn Conway generously offered to let Tom and I use her gear and the next day we snagged it.

Gary knew the way to the cave, Meliene confirmed it, and Tom and I followed. The entrance is a hole in the side of a hill and you have to make a climb down in to it before reaching the gate. Gary unlocked the gate, checked for rattlesnakes, and eased himself in. We followed. The snug entrance crawl is littered with rocks, leaves, and webs. The crawl opens up into a good sized room with 11 tiny bats clinging dormantly to the ceiling. One bat was covered in dew.

We milled around the room and noticed some new graffiti on the wall. What a disappointment. Then, we went on to the rest of cave. This cave has a little bit of everything. Gypsum crystals sparkle on the walls. There are stalagmites and stalactites in one area of the cave. Some of the walking passage is serpentine and curvy. And, just when you are through exploring a large room, you realize the way to go on is to crawl through more passage only to stand up again in another room. We noticed the cave is a lot like a playground as we slithered through the holes and tunnels.

Having reached the back of the cave, we returned to the entrance quickly in hopes of seeing Walk Up Cave which is near Little Crystal. But, Gary and Meliene had trouble finding the entrance that is close to Little Crystal and we spent too much time looking for it. The sun began to set. So, we went back to the truck which was parked by the other entrance to Walk Up and Tom and I looked wide-eyed at the incredible graffiti in a sky light room just past the entrance crawl of this cave. Losing time, we crawled back out and promised to go back to see the entire cave some other day.

As is the tradition, we had dinner at the Pizza Hut in Quanah before starting our drive home. It was a fun trip and a good way to start the new year. Tom and I particularly enjoyed hiking the land around the cave and enjoying the fantastic view of the Pease River. I look forward to going back.
