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




Tony Grieco took advantage of the week following the Bat Cave Blowout this month by becoming a hermit in the Gila Wilderness of Eastern New Mexico. At last report he was holed up in an abandoned shack with seventeen rocking chairs and two tons of carbide exclaiming that he'd achieved Nirvana.

SWR Summer Regional and Second Annual Bat Cave Blowout, June 1 and 2, 1985, Montgomery Cave, Terrell County Texas. Reported by Bill Greenlee and Bill Bentley.

A modest turnout of truly hardcore spylunks made this event a howling success. The out-of- state guests were undaunted by the remoteness of Montgomery Cave, although most complained a little about the "Texas miles" indicated on the road map. A total of twenty-five Homo sapiens and two canines attended. This figure does not include two Arizona cavers who dropped in Sunday morning to say "Hi".

The Permian Basin representatives included Bill Bentley, Coyote Coston, Bill Greenlee, Tony Grieco, Matt Killam, and Pat Hill. The Pecos Valley Grotto's delegates to the Blowout were Dave & Carol Belski, Slim Baxter, Tom Dillon, Lois Larkins, Joli Eaton and her children Treva, Gene, and Beth. Mesilla Valley grottoids Tim & Karen George, Dick Larson, Dave Gose, Mary Ann Roth, Jeff Lory, Steve, Kathy, and Luke Peerman also attended. Mike Lorimer, presently unaffiliated and living in Austin, completes the list of hearty speleosouls.

Mike's and Mary Ann's dogs reputedly had a sordid love affair during the weekend. They are said to have slept together (the dogs, that is). Joli said that the Forest Service accepted her application as a cave resource technician in the Guadalupes this summer. Tom showed me a compact and light ascent system that uses Prusik knots - good for those difficult-to-reach yet short drops found so often in the Guads. Dave Gose displayed an inventive modification to the Gibbs ascender that assures proper positioning while attached to the foot.

The Saturday morning SWR meeting covered several topics. First, the SWR sew-on patches, valued at \$2 apiece now, will cost \$3 each next summer at the NSS Convention. Jeff Lory is warden of the patches, so contact him and get yours now! Speaking of conventions, the 86 NSS Convention will convene at Tularosa, New Mexico during June 23 through 28, 1986. Preparations for this mega-event are already under way. Coordination between and cooperation from all SWR grottos is a must. The group decided by vote that one fragile cave in particular should be omitted from the Convention guidebook while still maintaining the proper spirit. The group also determined that the next SWR regional will be at Freezeout Canyon in New Mexico over Labor Day weekend. The forthcoming \*85 NSS Convention in Kentucky was announced. After all grotto chair-spylunks reported on individual club activity, we adjourned for caving.

Bill Bentley reports that, "After the meeting, I decended into the cave to the third level, where I directed traffic to the final drop in Montgomery Cave. Then, I went down and found most everyone enjoying the gypsum crystals that decorate the lower level. Proceeding to the North end of the cave, and up the Haynes ladder to the bypass tunnel, I ran into Tom Dillon. After showing him the Haynes Brothers' Bypass, we crawled back down the ladder and met Bill Greenlee, Dave Belski, and Tony Grieco. Tom and Dave were impressed by the sixty-foot tall gyp crystal formation known as 'Old Grandad'. Almost everyone was in the cave when I ascended. We recovered an old rope and wood ladder from the bottom of the cave upon request of the landowner. After resting for awhile, Kathy and Joli asked me to guide them into the cave, so off we went into the depths.

"Kathy, Joli, Jeff, and I reached the bottom in about 45 minutes. We strolled into the South end of the cave and up into the Dome Climb. Kathy tried it first, then decided to let me lead. I've never seen such determination by two women to climb a dome, but they succeeded; it scares me to think about it. Once past the dome, we exited through Haynes Bypass and down the ladder at the North end of the cave. The ascent went smothly, and everyone was on the surface an hour later."

The cavers quenched their speleosweat in the nearby stocktank. Veteran Dave Belski rates the tank with four stars. However, with the heat, I suspect he would have given a mudhole at least one star.

The "Skipper Roast" highlighted the evening and consummated the Bat Cave Blowout ritual. Four Eveready flashlights were sacrificed to the flames. This symbolizes the superiority of carbide over shoddy unreliable electric light. Bill Bentley describes the occaision:

"As the sun set in the West, a nearby storm provided a spectacular light show. Bill Greenlee announced that the Skipper flashlight roast was about to begin. Everyone made their way to Coy's fireplace and watched as the Skipper flashlights melted and oozed into the fire in a molten, gooey mess."

Coy provided refreshments in the form of a seemingly harmless concoction he calls 'E punch'. I wonder what the E stands for. The angered Skipper God let loose a storm that sent everyone scrambling for cover.

Next morning, after derigging the cave and policing the area, everyone parted company. Those with long drives headed home, but one group went to the Caverns of Sonora. I led a small group consisting of Tom, Slim, Matt, and Pat to Bat Cave near Sheffield. Last year, at the first Blowout, the PBSS hauled over a dozen large bags of trash out of the cave. This time, we could only fill half a bag. Tom and Slim seemed impressed with the size of the rooms and said we should consider having a SWR regional at Bat Cave sometime, since the cave is suitable for children to visit and is easily accessable.

Many thanks to everyone who participated in the PBSS's first regional. May it certainly be our priveledge to host another. I'll see y'all Labor Dayin the meantime, keep on grottin'....
