
JUNE 25-29, 1984: NSS Convention, Sheridan, Wyoming

history and goals, and was accepted with a round of applause. Saturday night included nude hot tubbing and slide shows on several of Texas' finest caves. A great time was had by all.

Besides myself, Dennis and Glenn Haynes from Fort Stockton, Texas and Lloyd Goldwire from Sanderson, Texas attended and represented the P.B.S.S.

MAY 26-27, 1984: Bill Greenlee, Tony Grieco, Tom Hefner, John Hill, Terry Hill and Vern Martin (also known as the Keystone Kavers) took a cave trip that will be long remembered in the annals o West Texas Speleology.

The trip was to be to Hell Below and Gunsight Caves, neither of which had ever been visited by anyone in our group - thus, our first stop (and some would maintain our first mistake!) was to visit Dave and Carol Belski for directions. We left the Belski's Fridanight armed with a topo map and detaile verbal instructions as to location of the caves, rigging the drop in Hell Below and warnings about Hell Below's infamous equipment-eating crack.

Saturday the Keystone Kavers set off in an optimistic mood to find Hell Below. "This will be a piece of cake!" we all thought- and indeed it was, for we found the entrance in only 15 or 20 minutes. The entrance we saw, however, (a) didn't look anything like what we had been led believe it should, (b) didn't look like it had an unlockable gate, (c) wasn't anywhere near where we had expected it to be and (d) was too easy to find - caves are never that easy to find. With these "facts" in mind, we collectively concluded that this hole must be a secondary opening and that the real entrance lay further on.

It didn't, but it took us three hours of intense searching "further on" before we figured it out.

Once in the cave, things started moving more routinely, and in fact the drop was fairly simple to rig and climb. The infamous "equipment eating crack" only claimed one article, a flashlight (mine, dammit!), but I like to think that this sacrifice to Oztotl assured us a safe cave trip.

After a sterling performance like Saturday's, we hoped that Sunday's trip would be more rountine. Exhausted from the previous day's foray, but nonetheless enthusiastic, the Keystone Kavers set out on the long hike to Gunsight Cave. accoutered once again with Belski's topo map. To make a long story short, we found the cave, but this didn't stop us from looking for it! We thought that the big hole on the side of the next ridge was Sentinel Cave, and that Gunsight was just below us on the ridge, separated from us by only one nasty climb. We were wrong. Fortunately, the heat, exhaustion and lateness in the day led the group to make its only good decision of the weekend - we said to hell with it and went back to the cars. We now know that, had we made that nasty climb, we would never have found that cave, because Gunsight cave was the big hole on the next ridge!
