MISCELLANEOUS



TCMA News: A Note from the **Executive Director**

it's time for the recreational caving community to take a long, resume for the recreations during community to take a long, and look at their level of commitment to the resource that they depend on for fun and adventure, i contend that if we lon't participate and commit our time, money and energies to lon't participate and commit our time, money and energies to reserving and managing cave resources they will be lest, which We will not immediately lose access to all caves; still be a gradual process through "development," withdrawal and neglect. It's time for an "attitude check". For too long we have been thinking that maintaining good are owner relations and adhering to the "take nothing but itcurse..." ethic was sufficient precaution and payment for risitation and protection. While these are unquestionably secessary, it's no longer enough. Contrary to our impressions within the limited sphere of fellow cavers, there is no clear, strong land or resource ethic in the United States at this time. The National Environmental Policy Act was adopted almost 20 years ago, and it still is considered to represent a controversy between public welfare and private land ownership rights. We have the duty to represent the environmental ethic inherent in this debate and educate the public about our pocition. Due to our recreational activities, we have an unusual sensitivity to the consequences of unregulated development on cave resources, groundwater hydrology, etc. Contrary to our impressions within the limited ephere of

Caving, however, is not a licensed profession because society as a whole has not recognized the potentially severe consequences of incompetent resource management. Our responsibility goes beyond marshalling data and information and cataloging these facts. Our responsibility is to put facts into a context of shared community values to affect appropriate change, in other words advocacy. We are expectable, for strengthcoing, at saver, conceptuity, the appropriate change, in other worth acroscopt, we are responsible for strengthening, at every opportunity, the resource and land ethic that is slowly developing in our society. We are among the groupd that must lead society to a recognition that humankind has to become an integral part of our earth's ecosystem or suffer the consequences of existence.
