



A Blast from the Past

Lighting Up the Black Hole

On June 10th of this year, Ruel Metcalf, Mike Gray, Cheryl Kettle, Dwaine and John Robert Moore, and I returned to a cave on private land a few miles south of Midland. The landowner had graciously given us permission to enter this 97' vertical cave and explore what turned out to be a football stadium sized room with a smaller passageway leading into another room with some of the most beautiful flowstone formations we had ever seen.

The rancher that owns the cave told us he had never been inside and would like to know what it looked like. So we hauled a portable gasoline generator, about 300 feet of electrical extension cord, and some flood lights into the cave to make a videotape. It took almost the whole day to lower all this stuff down the vertical shaft, which was very narrow in places, set it up inside to do the film, and then haul it all out again. It was a real education in what Hollywood film makers often have to go through, but we got some great video as well as some still photos.

In the twilight zone below the vertical shaft we have seen frogs and mice living among the rocks of the big pile of breakdown in the middle of the room. On this trip we also found, or rather Mike Gray found, a snake we'll have to call Sneaky Snake because of his subtle way of changing the conversation to center on himself.

Sneaky Snake, no doubt drawn out of hiding because of all the light and noise, was rummaging through our packs in hopes we had brought along something good to eat when he ran into Mike Gray.


Mike's high school English teacher would have been proud at his ability to string several hundred expletives together in a single running sentence without taking a breath. Mike never has liked surprises and he did levitate about 3 feet above the breakdown floor. I reckoned his hang time to be at least 4 or 5 seconds. Even Sneaky Snake was impressed, raising up off the floor to watch Mike bouncing around in the air above. Cheryl Kettle standing nearby shook her head and walked away. Sneaky Snake went back to examining the packs and later posed for photos.

We have made two trips to this cave and have had great fun with it. It has remained largely undisturbed through the years, and we hope things will stay that way. The room with the only formations is very small, but broken formations are mixed in with the breakdown on the floor, indications of what was once a very beautiful cave.

We would like to express our appreciation to the rancher that owns this beautiful cave for the great time we had exploring it.

Written by the influential Bill Steele, “Huatla” catches the imagination on multiple fronts. The sense and longing for discovery can be felt in Steele’s words throughout the book and it is deep caving at its best. “Huatla” is written in a fervor only possible when one truly loves the subject matter.


The book recounts the exploration of the Huatla region of Mexico, and the

life of Steele over the course of thirty years. Having these two separate foci enriches the experience greatly. On one side you’re following Steele’s turbulent early life and catching small bits of Texas caver history. The opposite exists in that entire chapters deal with a single expedition focusing purely on the remotest of details such as the smell one experiences when exiting a cave after being starved from such earthly smells for so long. Another detail not so nice as the previous recollections is the number of times Steele faced death and only through his quick instincts or probably more so just luck avoided such horrifying ends such as plummets down pits, falling from free-climbs, or my personal favorite in which Steele is doing everything able to save himself and several others from certain death at the hands of Mexican Indians whom Christmas celebrations nearly included throwing our brave cavers to there death to the bottom of a sinkhole.

Taking just the above summary into


account one might feel the story embellished slightly. When one witnesses Steele in cowboy boots and black “flaming” tights most would certainly feel it was so embellished, and yet his accounts become glaringly believable when one reads into the middle and later portions of the book. It is with great courage and wanting of a truthful account that Steele writes about some of his personal reactions with others in our caving world. Many of these recollections are of a positive account, though one will read other accounts and while subtle they build into a tumultuous tidal wave.

I’d like to end this review in saying that many people throw the word “hero” around and yet after reading this book I can only state that on numerous occasions Steele acted responsibly and heroically in both his respect for the cave and his concern and care for his teammates, I think that fits my description of a hero.



Brad works daytime so I go in my cave after he leaves and I'm out before he comes home. One time I left a note and spent the night and he was really mad at me the next day, even though I got home in time to make him his

SWR Labor Day Regional

Directions to the SWR Labor Day Regional
SEPTEMBER 5-7, 2009

At the Memorial Day Regional, the region voted to hold the Labor Day Regional at a camping area near where we think Piñon Cave is. The camping area is quite nice, with lots of large pine trees and a large flat grassy area for camping.

To get to the area, take Hwy 82 from west from Artesia, or east from Cloudcroft to Mayhill, NM. Just south of Mayhill, take SR 130 5.1 miles to the intersection of SR130 and SR 24. Turn south onto SR 24 and follow it for 17.9 miles and turn right onto Piñon Draw Road (also known as County Road E017, or Forest Road 183). Follow this unpaved road for 6 miles and look for a wide grassy area on the south (left) side of the road. That is it!

Piñon Cave itself is many miles south and west of this camping area. There is a primitive road from the camping area to the area of the cave. However to get to the cave, it will be necessary to hike from the end of this road.

All road access to Piñon Cave is across private land and is blocked by locked gates.

Piñon Cave is known to have a vertical entrance and is reported to have a large chamber with good air blowing from a breakdown choke.

No one in the active caving community has been to the cave in many years, certainly before GPS technology. No pictures are known of the cave. Just relocating the entrance would be a good outcome of this regional.

Hope to see everyone there!
